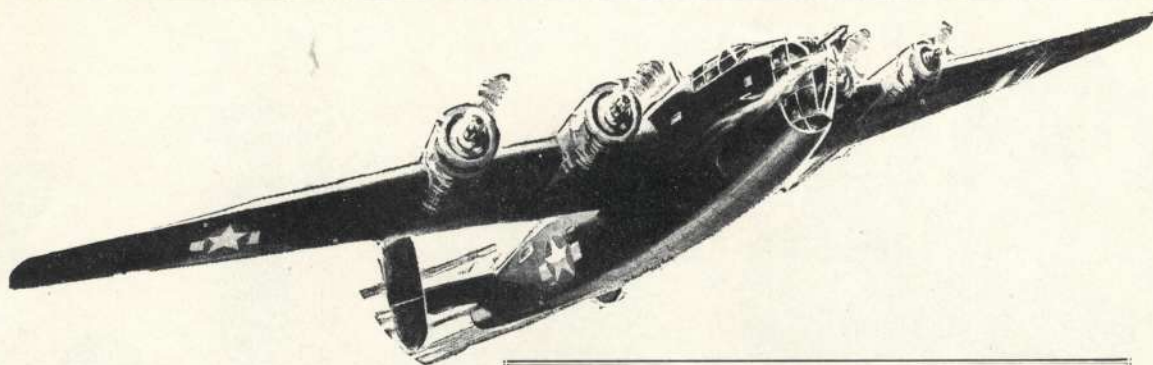

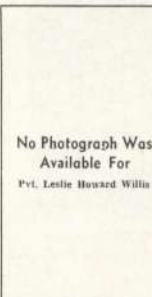

when he grew up.

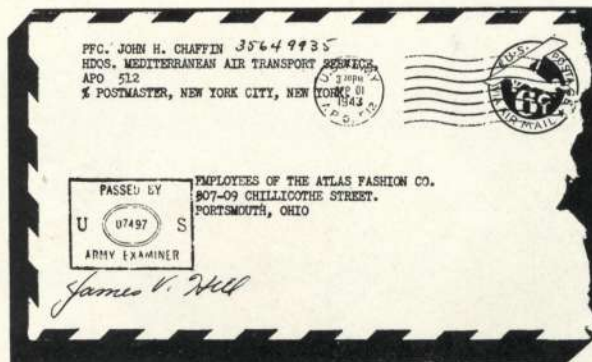
Time has made him every inch a man, but time cannot erase

## A letter from our Johnny Chaffin



North Africa,  
September 9, 1943.

Employees of Atlas' Fashion,  
307-09 Chillicothe Street,  
Portsmouth, Ohio.

Hello Folks:

Sorry I haven't written sooner but I've been pretty busy over here in north Africa. Not much time to write letters. Not very busy at this moment so I will try to write you a little note now.

The way the war is progressing now it looks like it won't be long until I am back home with all of you again. I wish I were there now but I've got a little more work to do over here first. I imagine the people in Portsmouth were very glad to hear of the fall of Italy. You can't even start to realize how we felt.

War bonds and stamps brought on the collapse of Italy and it will bring on the downfall of Germany and Japan. Atlas' Fashion has always been leaders in Portsmouth in their war bond sales. Keep up the good work. You have the sincere thanks of every boy serving Old Glory on foreign soil.

I must get back to work now so I will bring this thing to a finish. All of you write to me and I will try to answer all your letters individually.

Johnny, your letter came at the beginning of the Third war loan, just at a time when the entire Atlas' Fashion family was getting set to do our job of selling a lot of bonds. Johnny the man!
