INTRODUCTION

This list includes the principal files in the Johnson Library that contain material relating to the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics. It is not definitive, however, and researchers should consult with the Library's archivists about other potentially useful files. The guide includes those collections that have been opened for research in part or in whole, and those collections that are currently unprocessed or unavailable. Consult the finding aids for information concerning availability of materials.

Consult the guide titled "Arms Control and Disarmament" (CO 303, FG 293, FG 643, ND 21, PC 1) for additional materials on the USSR.

Researchers interested in this topic should also consult the *Foreign Relations of the United States*. This multi-volume series published by the Office of the Historian of the Department of State presents the official documentary historical record of major foreign policy decisions and diplomatic activity of the United States Government. NATIONAL SECURITY FILE (NSF)

The National Security File was the working file of President Johnson's special assistants for national security affairs, McGeorge Bundy and Walt W. Rostow. Documents in this file originated in the offices of Bundy and Rostow and their staffs, in various executive departments and agencies, especially those having to do with foreign affairs and national defense, and in diplomatic and military posts around the world.

More than half of the National Security File has been processed. Consult the finding aid in the Reading Room or borrow a copy by mail by writing to the Supervisory Archivist, LBJ Library, 2313 Red River St., Austin, Texas 78705. Some portions of the National Security File finding aid are also available on our web site at <http://www.lbjlib/utexas.edu>. Those folders **in the finding aid** whose titles are preceded by an "X", an asterisk, or a date have been processed and their contents declassified in whole or in part. Lists of classified documents have been placed in those folders, and you may request mandatory declassification review of individual documents that have not yet been declassified in full. The appropriate forms may be requested in the Reading Room or by mail. Those folders not preceded by an "X", an asterisk, or a date

are unprocessed and are not subject to mandatory declassification review. Consult with a member of the staff on the processing schedule.

JOHN McCONE MEMORANDA

This collection, part of the Papers of Lyndon B. Johnson, consists of notes of sixty-eight Presidential meetings attended by Director of Central Intelligence John McCone between November 23, 1963, and McCone's resignation on April 28, 1965. In addition, there are notes for four Presidential

meetings which one or more of McCone's key aides attended in his stead.

Ranging from NSC meetings to smaller gatherings of foreign policy advisers to McCone's meetings alone with the President, the meetings concern a great variety of international issues, with Vietnam a prominent topic. McCone himself prepared the notes for fifty-seven of the meetings. In the other fifteen cases, the notes were prepared by one of the aides (such as William Colby, Desmond Fitzgerald, Marshall Carter, or Ray Cline), who attended the meeting with McCone or in his place.

Mr. McCone gave the collection of notes to President Johnson in 1969 to assist the former President with the preparation of his memoirs, The Vantage Point.

A card file in the Reading Room indicates which Name Files have been opened. Name Files will be processed upon request.

WHITE HOUSE CENTRAL FILES - CONFIDENTIAL FILE (C.F.)

Security classified and other sensitive material sent to the White House Central Files was usually placed in the Confidential File, a separate file from WHCF but one which uses the same subject headings. This file is entirely processed, but portions are still classified. See the description above of WHCF for a list of pertinent subjects. The Confidential File also includes a Name File.

DAILY DIARY AND PRESIDENT'S APPOINTMENT FILE (DIARY BACKUP)

The Daily Diary is a log of the President's activities, appointments, and phone calls. Occasionally it includes information on the substance of meetings and conversations. See, for example, the Daily Diary for June 23 and 25, 1967, for material on the Glassboro meetings. The Daily Diary for these days is on the LBJ Library web site.

Diary Backup is a file of backup material for the President's appointments includes schedules, briefing materials, memoranda of conversations, and other sources. Organized by date, there is a folder for almost every day of the administration. The Diary Cards in the Reading Room provide an alphabetically arranged name index to the President's appointments. Once the date of an appointment has been determined, check the "Diaries and Logs" finding aid for the number of the appropriate box in Diary Backup. HANDWRITING FILE

More than 15,000 pages of memos, notes, doodles, and other documents with Lyndon Johnson's handwriting (excluding material normally filed in the National Security File) were placed in a special Handwriting File during the Johnson presidency. Copies were frequently placed in the regular files, but some documents in this file cannot be found elsewhere (for example, the scratch pad notes collected by secretaries from the Oval Office and the Cabinet Room). The file is arranged chronologically, making it possible to check for material on the Soviet Union or Eastern Europe for certain times.

At the close of the Johnson administration, each department and agency was asked to prepare a history of its activities and accomplishments during the Johnson years. The histories consist of narratives with documentary supplements.

RECORDINGS AND TRANSCRIPTS OF TELEPHONE CONVERSATIONS AND MEETINGS

The Johnson Library staff is currently processing the recordings and transcripts of President Johnson's telephone conversations and meetings. The collection includes over 6,000 recordings of conversations with members of Congress, other public officials, civil rights leaders, members of the press, and friends and family from November 1963 through January 1969, as well as recordings of meetings held in the Cabinet Room in 1968. Transcripts and recordings dealing with the assassination of President Kennedy have been processed first, and the remaining telephone conversations, released in segments, are being processed in chronological order. Recordings of meetings will be processed after all of the telephone conversations are processed. However, transcripts of three meetings concerning the invasion of Czechoslovakia are available in the *Foreign Relations of the United States*, Volume XVII, Eastern

Europe, and the recordings are available on the LBJ Library's Tape SC.01. Researchers should be cautioned that the transcripts included in this collection are not always reliable and should never be used without consulting the actual recording to assure accuracy.

The collection includes a significant number of recorded conversations that mention the topics of the USSR and Eastern Europe. Detailed individual descriptions of the available conversations, as well as information about purchasing copies of tapes and transcripts, are available on the Library's web site (<http://www.lbjlib.utexas.edu>) and in the Library's Reading Room, (512) 721-0212.
