# SCHOOL BOND VOTES URGENTLY NEEDED

#### MEANS WORK FOR MANY

Great interest centers on the school bond election, November 19. The message has gone forth that not only would the school buildings be strengthened against earthquak-s, but that the United States government would give us as an outright present to the district \$10,139,727 if the bonds carry.

Simply, the present from the government would amount to 45 cents for every 55 cents the people vote in bonds.

The bonds would be for \$12, 393,000.

Thinking of their own safety in event of another earth shock, students of the schools and their parents are working to see that the campaign wins. Business leaders also are striving for the success of the bonds, because they want the district to get the \$10,139,727 that the government has pledged, contingent upon the election.

Although the election date is generally known, pupils are urged to carry the news to their parents.

If the bonds win, hundreds of men will find work in the great job of rehabilitating the school buildings Hundreds of children would be taken out of tents and bungalows as soon as their class rooms have been made safer for them. But the bonds MUST win, if this important improvement is to be made.

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## Student Body Finance

The Student Body operates many important service activites under a business organization. known as the Student Body Fi nance.

The Siren for example publishes approximately 25,000 copies a year, including about 3,500 "anuals." The revenue from this activity for the past year, was\$350.45 from subscriptions and \$17 from ads. The expense for paper, printing, cuts amounts to \$362 leaving a balance of \$4.55, or one

The Towels account for last year, was not so lucky, "Boys Towels" lost eighteen per cent, collecting \$510.49 and paying out \$623.85 for laundering charges. The unfavorable balance in this case is \$113.36. "Girls Towels" made a profit of \$27.69, with collections of \$126.55 and expenditures amounting to \$98.88. Towels are laundered at a rate of \$1. 35 per hundred. What is our showoring frequency?

How do you like our Aud is charged to a fund called Enter-

The bill for last year was \$278.85. Since all programs are free, only red ink is used in keeping the books for this activity.
