# HUNT FOR JOB BRINGS ARREST

**Prison Break 17 Years  
Ago Laid to Suspect**

An attempt to get a job as a civilian clerk in the Los Angeles Police Department yesterday resulted in the arrest of Trent D. Bushwar, 40, of 217 E. 25th St., as an escaped fugitive from a Texas prison.

When Bushwar, alias Ted Brown, applied for a job as a card filer in the police record bureau a month ago, his fingerprints were taken and sent to the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Washington, D.C., as is customary.

Federal agents wired back that their records showed him to have escaped from the Huntsville Prison, in Texas, 17 years ago.

Police said his wife is known as Mrs. Ted Brown and is an expectant mother.
