OUR WORK ENJOYS STEADY PROGRESS

Since the publication of our last bulletin the work of Camp Little Norway Association, Inc., has enjoyed a most encouraging expansion and intensification in all localities, chapters, and divisions. It really seems as if we, during the first half of 1943, have been getting into our full stride. It has been very heartening to read the reports of enlarged activity and growing liberality of giving as they have come from our friends throughout America, even into the far away districts of Alaska. For all this cooperation and good will the Camp Little Norway Association is very grateful indeed.

We find it opportune at this particular moment to assure our friends and co-workers everywhere that there is clear sailing ahead for our common work in the interest of Norway, its fliers and seamen, our great allies of the Norwegian Army, Navy and Merchant Marine. Without revealing any military secrets, it seems probable that the Camp Little Norway at Muskoka, Canada, in the near future will see an increased force of fliers in training, and it is also probable that our association may be called upon to participate in new adventures of assistance for the benefit of the men of heroic Norway, both here and abroad. We will make it a policy at all times to inform our co-workers about the different moves through circulars as well as through the Norwegian-American Press.

As the war is hitting ever harder, it is up to us to meet the challenge of the day by a concentrated effort at helping our kinsmen and fellow allies in every manner possible within the limits of our registration with the President's War Relief Control Board, Washington, D. C. As American citizens we are very happy at the thought that our voluntary efforts in behalf of one of the greatest allied nations can express our deep-seated gratitude for all the values that our great old fatherland has given us.

THE VICTORIOUS R.N.A.F.

Fifty-four German Planes Shot Down:

From London news comes that the Norwegian fighting planes during the first five months of 1943 have shot down 54 German planes and damaged 40 others. In addition to these numbers, 12 more are given as possibly shot down.

These results have been accomplished in an ever increasing degree, month after month, as the summer light returns and the attack on occupied Europe increases. Thus the Norwegian fliers in January shot down 3 planes, while they in May accounted for no less than 20. Three of the German planes were shot down by Norwegians serving with the British Air forces.

The Norwegian losses, of course, cannot be revealed, but the relation is one of better than one to four, or four German planes lost for each Norwegian flier lost or missing. The Norwegian pursuit fliers are now under the command of a Norwegian Wing commander.

On Tuesday, June 1, Norwegian and Canadian planes, operating together, shot down 5 German planes under an offensive attack over Northern France. Two Focke Wulf 190 exploded at the height of several thousand feet after a bitter struggle with a Norwegian plane. Another Norwegian destroyed a Messerschmidt 190, which dived downwards, engulfed in flames, with a big piece of one wing shot off. Still another, Me 109 was hit by a Norwegian and dashed straight down with half of the tail shot away and part of the cockpit in pieces. This flier was counted as a probable one.

The week before two Norwegian squadrons of pursuit planes made an attack over Belgium and Northern France. On their journey they encountered six enemy pursuit planes which dived in order to escape combat, but the Norwegian fliers caught up with them, with the result that two FW 190 were shot down without loss to the R.N.A.F.

The spirit of fighting Norway, and the traditions of Camp Little Norway are being felt in an ever increasing degree in the air battle over occupied Europe. One day the liberation of the continent will be accomplished, with liberty and justice to all the subjugated nations.
