OUR WORK CONTINUES.

We are happy to announce that the coordination of Camp Little Norway Association and American Relief for Norway is now substantially completed and became effective October 1st, 1944. Under this arrangement, Camp Little Norway Association becomes a division of American Relief for Norway, Inc., and as such will be a participating member of the National War Fund, Inc.

For the fiscal year beginning October 1st, 1944, Camp Little Norway Association has been allotted \$100,000. Payments will be given us quarterly for U. S. O. type activities for Norway's Fighting Forces and Merchant Seamen. In consideration of this new allotment we agree not to make independent solicitations on our own behalf. However, Camp Little Norway Association, with its chapters, continue as one organization, and may receive voluntary contributions and may continue collections of membership dues, fees, and payments on pledges.

However, it is necessary after October 1st, 1944 that each chapter with its monthly report submit a list with the names and addresses of all contributors with the amount contributed by each, or sources of contributions and receipts.

It is important to note that any income so received will be charged against our budget allotment from the National War Fund, Inc.; therefore in effect only received by us and contributed to the War Fund. Our chapters may continue staging lectures, film showings, and entertainments, provided permission is first obtained from the local agency of the National War Fund, Inc., and provided such affairs will not be staged during any of the drives for War Bonds, National War Fund, or the Red Cross.

It is therefore obvious that in addition to all other reasons we have, as patriotic American citizens, to support the War Fund, we now also aid their work and the cause of Norway at the same time by so doing. Consequently, you are therefore urged to cooperate and participate actively in all War Fund drives.

In this connection we should like to point out that it will be advisable to have any contributions you may make or that may be secured by you from those working for the cause of Norway ear-marked "For Norway." By doing this, the War Fund will be informed of the work being done by Americans for the United Nations and with special emphasis because of the interest in Norway. It is true that any contributions received by Camp Little Norway Association are deducted from the War Fund allotments. However, it will be noted that the smaller the amount received from War Fund, Inc., the greater the showing that we are working for Norway.

We shall be happy to receive any suggestions or recommendations for disbursements within our budget limitations. Camp Little Norway Association will continue to function as a corporation with all its chapters and members, and with its organization intact, and we hope and urge that the new working arrangement will give inspiration to continue the good work for Norway which has been performed heretofore.

SEWING AND KNITTING ACTIVITIES

The Norwegian Sewing Room in New York has lately been able to buy large quantities of yarn for the knitting of stockings and sweaters for children in Norway and also cloth for such children. Dr. Rygg, who is looking after these activities on behalf of American Relief for Norway, Inc., reports that he expects to purchase such materials up to an amount of \$80,000 before very long.

It is self evident that with such a large quantity of material available great numbers of workers are *urgently* needed to knit the sweaters, mittens, socks, and all the other items which the people of Norway will be able to use. The war situation is such that very soon supplies may find their way to Norway, and we urge everyone to take up this work so the supplies will be ready when shipments can be made.

If there is no sewing and knitting center in your district please contact nearest chapter as shown on page 2, or Camp Little Norway Association, 827 Marquette Avenue, Minneapolis, Minnesota.

We have lately been informed that such articles as clothing and shoes can no longer be bought in Norway anywhere, which illustrates how important such gifts will be.

News from Camp Little Norway, Canada

Great numbers of new recruits have arrived in the last few months in Muskoka, and activities are therefore at a high pitch. The Norwegian squadrons overseas are continuing their excellent work and are making the Germans regret April ninth, 1940. The Norwegian Fighter Squadrons with their complete ground crews and their own equipment are now operating from their new continental bases.

National War Fund Appropriates

\$1,000,000 for Norway

Extract of letter from Mr. Birger Osland, National Treasurer of American Relief for Norway, Inc., dated August 7, 1944:

On July 24 a joint committee of representatives of American Relief for Norway, Inc., and Camp Little Norway Association met with the National War Fund Budget Committee in New York for the purpose of submitting their respective budgets for the coming fiscal year beginning October 1, 1944. On behalf of the Norwegian-American groups, which are now consolidated into one organization, the following were present: Birger Osland and A. E. Wigeland, Chicago; Dr. A. N. Rygg and Rolf K. Westad, New York; Prof. Oystein Ore, New Haven, Conn., and Jacob Stefferud, Minneapolis.

We enclose copy of the budget as approved by National War Fund. The total amount approved is one million dollars (\$1,000,000). We have asked the privilege of adjusting various items at the next regular meeting of directors in October, should the aspect of the war make it advisable.

American Relief for Norway, Inc., has pledged to National War Fund, Inc., its hearty and energetic support of the campaign for funds for the American U.S.O. and the war stricken nations which the National War Fund will conduct in October this year through the various Community Chests. We ask you to cooperate in this splendid endeavor.

In Approved Budget

For Period from October 1, 1944 to September 30, 1945, Inclusive.

1. Processing Clothing

Cleaning, repairing, packing, storing, and shipping clothing.

2. Food for Norway

Continued purchase of food in Sweden for distribution to children and adults in Norway.

3. Medicines and Vitamins

Continued purchase and shipment of medicines, medical supplies, and vitamins through American Red Cross to Sweden and their distribution in Norway.

4. Yarn, Cloth and Mill Ends

Continued purchase of yarn to be knitted into sweaters and stockings, of cloth to be made into garments, and of mill ends to be sewn together into regular size blankets by wornen volunteer sewing circles and clubs throughout the United States. These products are for later shipment to Norway.

5. American Labor-Sponsored Project

Funds sent to trustees in Stockholm, Sweden.

6. Families of Prisoners, etc.

Funds sent to neutral representatives for families of persons in concentration camps, etc.

- 7. Camp Little Norway (U.S.O. type) Services for Armed Forces and Merchant Seamen of Norway
 - (a) Purchase of materials for the making of Christmas gifts by volunteer workers, shipping expenses, and the financing of Christmas entertainments for service men in Canada, England, Iceland, and elsewhere.
 - (b) Purchase and shipment of educational, entertainment, and sports equipment and supplies and of soft drinks, eigarettes, chocolates, etc., and financing of special care of service men in hospitals and at convalescence and recreation camps (in Canada, England, Iceland, and elsewhere).
 - (c) Expenditures for merchant scamen for relief, comfort articles, and some entertainment, particularly in various hospitals and rest homes.
