COMMENTS:

A brief and primarily technical study of the time and locale of the microlithic culture in northeastern China just prior to the neolithic period. References to the prevalent economy as shown by the archeological finds are made only in general terms. The article points out that these early cultures were in a state of dynamic flux, as shown by the decline of microlithic culture vis-a-vis the polychrome pottery culture of China proper.
