





Company 535, CCC was organized May 19, 1933, at Fort Knox, Kentucky, and consisted of one sergeant, two corporals, and one private, first class. The company's first permanent location was Lyous Valley, California. The first month in Lyous Valley was spent in preparing for the first enrollment of 188 men.

Movements were from Lyous Valley to Minersville, California, to Havre, Montana, and then to the present site in Yellowstone Park, Wyoming.


The company has also operated a nursery while in Yellowstone Park with excellent results. Trees and shrubs from this nursery have been sent to many of the National Parks.


