



YESTERDAY - - - the pranksters of the neighborhood, TO-DAY - - - men - - - fighting for God and Country!



It's that something that makes you remember Bob, the kid who was so crazy about show horses -and did a good job with them-or Mox-the thrills you got when he made such a fine record playing football-or Joe, the kid who would rather hear the bay of a hound dog on Two-mile hill, than eat. Today they are men-young men-serving the cause of victory and freedom-on the land, on the sea and in the air. 
