the sites of the World War I, the remains of the officers and men who had been killed in battle or died in service during those operations, were gathered together and buried with full military honors in national cemeteries in the United States. These graves and monuments were erected on public lands which had been reserved for the American National Cemetery. In 1918, after the Mexican War a plot of about one acre in the City of Mexico was granted and the remains of the officers and soldiers were reinterred. In 1917, the cemetery passed into the control of the Army and has since been maintained as a National Cemetery. It was the first American Cemetery established on foreign soil with a view to permanent maintenance.

National Cemeteries are established by the Secretary of War under the provisions of the Congress of February 22, 1916, and on the 10th of August of that year, those established by the Secretary for the maintenance of the cemetery funds.

Monuments are provided as a burial place for a National Cemetery. A check of the active personnel names for the military service, the nationality, or other being necessary distributed from the service.

Cemeteries such as were established in Europe after World War I will be established in the various battle areas where American forces served during World War II, should the number of requests for the same of the Secretary of War of World War II exceed the permanent American Military Cemeteries overseas justify the same.

AMERICAN MILITARY CEMETERIES IN EUROPE

These cemeteries were established by the United States Army as a tribute to the memory of those of our boys who died in Europe during World War I. They are dedicated to provide a permanent home to the remains.

In the case of the American Expeditionary Forces, there were approximately 1,400,000 men in Europe in which American dead were interred. After the war, these remains were given to the Government of the country in which they were buried. The cemetery is being developed in accordance with the War Department plan for development of a well laid out and beautiful cemetery. The cemetery will be approximately 1,000 acres in extent. At present there are approximately 1,200 burials. An average of 20 burials per month is made in this cemetery.

 When it became apparent that burial space in the Long Island National Cemetery in Brooklyn, N. Y., would soon be exhausted, consideration was given to the establishment of a new cemetery for the New York area. This was accomplished and a possible site for a cemetery, plots, roads, and land for development and for security in relation to health. At a point, the Long Island National Cemetery was established in accordance with the War Department plan for development of a well laid out and beautiful cemetery. The cemetery will be approximately 1,000 acres in extent. At present there are approximately 1,200 burials. An average of 20 burials per month is made in this cemetery.

BALTIMORE NATIONAL CEMETERY, MARYLAND

In 1862 the War Department acquired by purchase 30 acres of land in Baltimore for the purpose of establishing a National Cemetery. The site, formerly an active rifle range, is situated on the banks of the Patuxent River. The cemetery was dedicated to the public in 1863.
