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THE Hoover Institution is a national center for documentation and research on problems of political, social and economic change in the twentieth century. The library includes six principal area collections: Africa, East Asia, Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union (Russia), Latin America, the Middle East, and Western Europe. Holdings include books, pamphlets, government documents, newspapers and periodicals, as well as the private papers of prominent individuals. The library presently contains more than 1,250,000 volumes, including government documents, some 24,000 periodical titles, about 6,000 newspaper titles, and almost 3,700 archival units. The Archives are the largest private repository in the United States.

Staff members come from 20 countries and speak 41 foreign languages. The Hoover Institution has its own resident research staff of economists, political scientists and historians, including both visiting and resident scholars. Research programs focus on basic research, documentary, and policy studies in both international and domestic areas. Some fifty scholars are currently pursuing independent projects at the Institution. Approximately 100 additional scholars are working at other academic centers on Hoover-supported projects.

In 1971 the Hoover Institution inaugurated a National Fellows Program, which includes National Fellows, Peace Fellows and Public Affairs Fellows. The Program offers younger scholars a one-year period for creative and unrestricted research in modern history, political science and international relations, economics and sociology. The purpose of the Public Affairs Fellows program is to prepare fellowship holders for service with legislators, legislative committees, and agencies and departments at the national level of government.

Since 1919, more than 275 volumes have been published by the Hoover Institution. In addition, research in the library collections and archives by visiting scholars and staff has resulted in several times that number of volumes appearing under the imprint of other publishing houses.
