



PÍO PICO

LAST MEXICAN GOVERNOR OR ALTA CALIFORNIA 1848, TALKING ABOUT IMMIGRANTS FROM THE U.S.




<u>Pio Pico</u> never stopped to warn the citizens of California about what he considered to be the biggest threat to the land: the immigrants from the U.S., the Yankees. The terms of this fear have reversed: originally the wealthy, Spanish speaking, Mexican rulers of California were the ones threatened by immigration. Their culture of California was at odds with that of the U.S. citizens that were entering Mexican land in pursue of wealth and happiness.

His fear proved to have a basis of truth: sensing the weakness of the young Mexican Empire, the U.S. pursued an aggressive military operation against its territory in 1846. In the midst of the crisis, Pio Pico became the governor or California and brought the capital to his beloved Los Angeles. From there, he tried to defend the California land from the invaders till the very end. He barely escaped to Baja California to plead for military support from the Mexican government, which he never got. **The Mexican-U.S. war** ended with the annexation of large territories to the United States all along the border: Texas, California, New Mexico, Arizona, and even parts of Colorado were taken from the Mexican nation and declared part of the U.S. by the Treaty of Guadalupe in 1848.

Mexican Californios were offered to stay in their own land if they **became U.S. citizens.** Over 90% did, including Pio Pico who was, above all, a wise businessman. He came back to Los Angeles and flourished in the private sector as a U.S. citizen, opening the *Pico House*, the first luxury hotel to be established in the city of Los Angeles. However, Pico who was known for his extravagant lifestyle, with fine clothes, expensive furnishings, and heavy gambling, ended up loosing all his fortune in the following decades although not his pride.

In 1893 a committee of local boosters and history enthusiasts offered Pico a large sum of money in exchange for appearing at the *Chicago World's Columbian Exposition* as **"the last of the California Dons"**. Pico refused, considering it an affront to his dignity. Penniless but proud, he died in Los Angeles a few years later, always to be remembered as *the last governor of Mexican California*.

HISTORICAL APPROACH

AS THE FIRST EPISODE OF THE SEASON, THIS EPISODE SHOULD SET THE TONE AND THE GENERAL APPROACH TO THE REEXAMINATION OF THE HIDDEN, FORGOTTEN OR MISUNDERSTOOD ASPECTS OF THE HISTORY OF LOS ANGELES.

FOR THIS REASON THIS EPISODE MUST ACCOMPLISH A DOBLE OBJECTIVE: NOT ONLY TO UNDERSTAND BUT ALSO TO SUBVERT MISCONCEPTIONS ASSOCIATED WITH ONE OF THE MOST OBSCURE CHAPTERS OF OUR HISTORY> THE SPANISH OCCUPATION OF THE LAND AND THE MISSION SYSTEM OF COLONIZATION. ON ONE HAND, WE MUST EXPOSE THE HISTORY OF THE LAND PREVIOUS TO ITS INCORPORATION TO THE UNITED STATES; ON THE OTHER, WE MUST ALSO QUESTION THE ROLES AND MOTIVATIONS OF THE KEY CHARACTERS ON THIS STORY.





THE LOST STORY OF L.A. IS OFTEN VISIBLE IN THE MAPS. LOS ANGELES STILL USES A FEW TOPONYMS THAT REMAIN FROM THE TONGVA LANGUAGE: *CAHUENGA, TOPANGA OR TUJUNGA*, AMONG OTHERS.

A LOT MORE HAS SURVIVED IN THE MAPS FROM THE HISPANIC CULTURES THAT FOUNDED MODERN LOS ANGELES. THE MISSION ORIGINAL NAMES ARE WELL AND ALIVE ALL OVER THE COUNTY: SAN GABRIEL, SAN FERNANDO OR PUEBLO OF LOS ANGELES ITSELF TO NAME A FEW. FROM THE MORE RECENT - BUT OFTEN MORE IGNORED - CALIFORNIO ERA WE CAN STILL TRACE DOZENS OF CLUES THAT REVEAL THE SPANISH MEXICAN FOUNDING OF THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES, AFTER TWO CENTURIES OF ATTEMPTS TO ERASE OR DISTORT THIS INHERITANCE.

FROM LA BREA TO LA CIENEGA, FROM LOS FELIZ TO PICO, FIGUEROA, ALVARADO OR SEPULVEDA, THE MOST FORGOTTEN STORY OF THIS CITY IS HIDDEN IN PLAIN SIGHT, READY TO BE FOUND IN CONTEMPORARY LOS ANGELES BY ANYBODY WHO CARES TO RECOGNIZE IT.
